

### Project Report ALTRUSA WINE & CHOCOLATE LITERARY SOCIETY READS ON & ON

We had a great turnout to discuss the selection for June, *The Chaperone,* by Laura Moriarty. The discussion was led by Jan Belcher. Thanks to all who participated and who brought sandwiches, snacks, wine and chocolate!

This was our historical fiction book selection for the year. The book traces two astonishing stories: the first of real-life actress and dancer Louise Brooks and the second of her fictionalized chaperone Cora Carlisle. The book follows the lives and adventures of both women and begins as the two venture to New York when Brooks is 15 years old. This was selected as one of Oprah's great summer reads of 2012.

The selection for July is **Still Alice** by Lisa Genova. The discussion will be led by Lois Ferrara on July 22, 2013, at Friends Place at 6pm.

Still Alice is a compelling debut novel about a 50-yearold woman's sudden descent into early onset Alzheimer's disease, written by Lisa Genova, who holds a PhD in neuroscience from Harvard University.

Alice Howland, happily married with three grown children and a house on the Cape, is a celebrated Harvard professor at the height of her career when she notices a forgetfulness creeping into her life. As confusion starts to cloud her thinking and her memory begins to fail her, she receives a devastating diagnosis: early onset Alzheimer's disease. Fiercely independent, Alice struggles to maintain her lifestyle and live in the moment, even as her sense of self is being stripped away. In turns heartbreaking,

inspiring and terrifying, *Still Alice* captures in remarkable detail what's it's like to literally lose your mind...

The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak is the 2013 selection for Richardson Reads One Book, and it is the selection for our August 26 book club meeting. Mary Beth McLemore will lead the discussion.

It's just a small story really, about among other things: a girl, some words, an accordionist, some fanatical Germans, a Jewish fist-fighter, and quite a lot of thievery.

With Death as narrator, Markus Zusak's haunting novel follows Liesel Meminger, The Book Thief, through the fear-filled years of Nazi Germany. The story opens as the ten-year-old girl takes her first book shortly after her younger brother's death. Both children were en route to the foster home of Hans and Rosa Hubermann in a Munich suburb. Despite Rosa's sharp tongue and Hans's lack of work, their home is a loving refuge for the nightmare-ridden girl. It also becomes a hideout for Max, a young Jewish man whose father saved Hans's life. There are good moments as Liesel learns to read and plays soccer, but Hans's ill-advised act of kindness to a Jewish prisoner forces Max to leave their safe house. The failing war effort and bombing by the Allies lead to more sacrifices, and eventually, to great losses. Reading books and writing down her experiences save Liesel, but this novel clearly depicts the devastating effects of war.



#### HOW CAN YOU HELP?

The Education Committee needs the support of Altrusa Richardson members to complete many of its projects. All Altrusans are invited to join us at Terrace Elementary for some great projects. There are two programs in which Altrusans who are busy during the day at the office can join us:

(1) Teddy Bear Time takes place in the evening and

(2) a first-time project called <u>Lunch Buddies</u> requires at least a twice a month lunchtime visit to the school for a half-hour lunch. You gotta eat lunch – so why not enrich the life of a child who needs you at the same time?

### PROJECTS FOR THIS SCHOOL YEAR INCLUDE:

**Classroom Assistance:** Assistance is needed in the Pre-K classroom on a scheduled basis. The assistance can be provided one hour every two weeks or more often. Pre-K Teacher Maribeth will have activities for you to work on with three children at a time.



Learning Backpacks: Our award-winning program supplies children and their families with a backpack of supplies for activities. There are 13 backpacks including Nutrition, Read to Me, Numbers, and PE. The



families borrow a backpack for a week and volunteers are needed to re-supply and inventory the backpacks.

Manners Party: This party is great fun and education for the children. After many months of practicing good manners, the children participate in a grand party complete with decorations, an exchange of gaily wrapped gift books, and ice cream sundaes.

**Teddy Bear Time:** This long-time Altrusa project encourages parents to read to their children. This event gives Altrusans in the workplace an opportunity to work with Pre-K children. Lots of volunteers are needed here!

In-School Field Trips: Special assemblies are organized for multiple grades. (i.e. The Bubble Lady)

**Eisemann Theatre Performances**: Altrusan Sarah Nesbit provides tickets for Terrace children and their families to go to the Eisemann Center for professional children's theater.

**Lunch Buddies:** Adopt a child for the year and eat lunch with that child at least twice monthly, just to talk.

Wednesday Club: A group of eight kindergarteners, selected by their teachers for their ability and good behavior, meet weekly for enrichment activities. The Wednesday Club needs volunteers to work with Andrea.

Trip to the **Perot Museum** for fourth graders. Want to come along?

### District Nine News NEWS OF MIGHTY NINTH NOW A MAGAZINE, EMPHASIS IS ON SERVICE



It is the group's big fundraiser for the year, with proceeds benefiting organizations such as Neighborhood Youth and Family Counseling, Warren Center and the city of Richardson Library's "Reads One Book program.

Norma Hammerlund of Richardson, co-chair of the nominating committee, said the organization is looking for outstanding women in corporate education, government, nonprofit, small business and Outstanding Women of Tomorrow (women younger than 35).

Nominations may be submitted from members and nonmembers, and nominees must live and/or work in Dallas or Collin counties.

"We are looking for women who are out there making a positive impact on our community," Hammerlund said.

Hammerlund highlighted notable projects such as helping an underprivileged school by mentoring and tutoring students and calling Bingo at a Richardson assisted living center - and then there's a relatively new project: providing pillows with cases embroidered with uplifting messages for residents at a shelter for abused women.

"Now the residents get a pillow with an inspiring message that they can take with them," she said.

### Altrusa Accent ALTRUSA AND THE UN

The preamble of the United Nations Charter affirms the aims and purposes that "we the peoples of the United Nations" are committed to realize through the United Nation's Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). The mission of ECOSOC, as set up by the Charter, is the promotion of "higher standards of living, full employment and conditions of economic and social progress and development: solutions of international economic, social, health and related problems; and universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion.," Article 71 of the Charter provides for NGO consultative status with ECOSOC. NGOs are non-governmental organizations whose work is related to ECOSOC's areas of responsibility, namely social and economic well being.

In 1946, Altrusa was the first international classified service club for executive and professional women to have an official observer appointed to the United Nations. An Altrusan with a strong connection to the United Nations was Eleanor Roosevelt, Mrs. Roosevelt was a member of the Altrusa Club of New York City. At the UN, Mrs. Roosevelt served as chairman of the Commission on Human Rights and was one of the drafters of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Traditionally, the Altrusa delegate and alternates are members of the New York City Club.
