Debbie Dobbs, Director of The Counseling Place, and her daughter Faith, came to our August business meeting to accept a check from our Community Initiative Fund for \$1,500.00 This amount will allow The Counseling Place to furnish a Telethon Room and it gives us naming rights on this room. Our club chose to donate this large amount because of the increased need for mental health services. Additionally, this relationship offers us the opportunity for hands-on activities our club may want to do for them. Our club typically wants to do more hands-on activities than our budget allows. This fund provides the luxury for service committees to request additional money after

Her counselors are beginning to work with groups of young people, making them aware of ways to avoid being abused or abusing others. She said, "The Counseling Place works with many abused adults, but it is hard to get some adults to leave an abusive situation." The counselors at Debbie's facility hope by working with children, they may be able to stop the current cycle of abuse.


Each year September 8th marks UNESCO's **International Literacy day**, raising awareness globally on the issues surrounding adult and child literacy. First held in 1966 and now part of the UN's sustainable development goals program adopted in 2015, International Literacy day highlights the changes and improvements being made worldwide in literacy development.

UNESCO has been central to improving global literacy since 1946 and promotes **International Literacy day** in partnership with governments, charities, local communities and experts in the field worldwide. Using themes and programs the day aims to turn attention on literacy in all its forms in a changing world. Recognizing literacy encompasses more than the written word in societies today the theme for 2017 was 'Literacy in the Digital World'.

International Literacy Day is a day to remind world leaders, influencers and the general public of the current status of adult literacy and learning. UNESCO has used the phrase "Literacy is the best remedy" in its banners seeing literacy as key to the right for all to an education. In 2015 the UN adopted its Sustainable Development goals to mobilize efforts to eradicate poverty and inequalities across the world, of which improving literacy rates is an integral element.

#### **UN International Day of Peace**



Each year the International Day of Peace is observed around the world on **21 September**. The General Assembly has declared this as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, both within and among all nations and peoples.

The United Nations Member States adopted the 17 Sustainable Development Goals in 2015 because they understood that it would not be possible to build a peaceful world if steps were not taken to achieve economic and social development for all people everywhere, and ensure that their rights were protected. The Sustainable Goals cover a broad range of issues, including poverty, hunger, health, education, climate change, gender equality, water, sanitation, energy, environment and social justice.

Sustainable Development Goal 16 "Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions" calls for promoting peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, providing access to justice for all and building effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels.





The theme for the International Day of Peace in 2018 is "The Right to Peace - The Universal Declaration of Human Rights at 70"

The <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> is a milestone document in the history of human rights. Drafted by representatives with different legal and cultural backgrounds from all regions of the world, the Declaration was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in Paris on 10 December 1948 as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations.

The Universal Declaration states in Article 3. "Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person." These elements build the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world.

The Universal Declaration – the most translated document in the world, available in more than 500 languages - is as relevant today as it was on the day that it was adopted.
